Reporting: Information for parents



The Queensland Department of Education outlines requirements for schools around the delivery of the Australian Curriculum and reporting on student achievement through the P-12 Curriculum, assessment and reporting framework (P-12 Framework). Reporting to parents, a supporting document of the P-12 Framework, outlines the requirements for all Queensland State Schools. Schools have some flexibility to determine when and how the learning areas will be reported on. In order to understand how we report at Highfields State School, we must first understand how the Australian Curriculum is structured.

From the first year of schooling to Year 6, the Australian Curriculum outlines the development of knowledge and skills in eight learning areas:

- English
- Mathematics
- Science
- Health and Physical Education (HPE)
- Humanities and Social Sciences (HASS)
- The Arts
- Technologies
- Languages

Some learning areas bring a number of subjects or strands together:

- Humanities and Social Sciences includes the subjects History, Geography, Civics and Citizenship, and Economics and Business
- The Arts includes the subjects Dance, Drama, Media Arts, Music and Visual Arts
- Technologies includes the subjects Design & Technologies and Digital Technologies
- HPE includes two strands: Physical Education and Health

'Banded' Curriculum Areas

While some learning areas have their content organised for each year level, some learning areas organise the content within that learning area across **bands** of year levels. For example, the HASS curriculum is organised into a P-Yr 2 band, a Yr 3-4 band and a Yr 5-6 band. The table below indicates how each learning area is 'banded' from Prep to Year 6.

From this table we can see that the coverage of the curriculum occurs in 'bands' of year levels. Reporting in Queensland State Schools is designed to account for the structure of the learning areas within years, and across bands of years.

Reporting to Parents

Because of the nature of the banded learning areas, reporting requirements differ across the learning areas and years of schooling:

What does this mean for parents?

What this means, is that from Semester 1 in 2022, you will see some changes in the way we are reporting on your child's academic achievement in the learning areas at Highfields State School. For example:

- In the past Physical Education and Health have been reported separately. There will now be a combined achievement and effort rating for the learning area of HPE.
- In the past Music has been reported every semester. As Music is only *one subject* within the learning area of The Arts, it need not be reported every semester. The students' achievement in Music will be reported in one semester of each year and achievement in the other Arts strands will be reported in the alternate semester of each year against the Arts Achievement Standard.
- Japanese will be reported in the final semester of the band P-2, in the second semester of both Year 3 and Year 4, and each semester across Years 5 and 6.

Where students are participating in a learning area not being reported that semester, parents will be able to discuss their child's progress at the parent teacher interview or will be able to make an appointment for an interview with the relevant specialist teacher.

At Highfields State School, we continue to strive to offer high quality teaching and learning programs and to communicate with families in a clear and transparent way to ensure parents understand:

- the learning expectations for the student;
- the student's achievement against the expected standards;
- how well the student is engaging with the expected learning; and
- how each student may be able to improve.
